III. Speaker Q&A

a. Discussion included CalRecycle grants and loans (how much has been provided, community benefits, food rescue and greenhouse gas reduction are some of the criteria) and analysis of progress toward the SB 1383 waste reduction goals, cart tagging, cautionary tales to achieve waste reduction goals with SB 1383 (main message is there needs to be enough lead time to build infrastructure), how CalRecycle works with local jurisdiction partners, what happens to digestate from anaerobic digestion (concerns with soil chemistry impacts, food rescue increases (pre- and post-covid), low population area waivers, how support is provided in rural counties, how food rescue programs before, during and after COVID-19 have worked, incorporation of small food waste producing businesses and the right sizing bins, temporary procurement or long-term requirements, incorporating soil carbon sequestration, providing living wages for businesses, diversion rates, political pushback for SB 1383, and that contracts with local governments give certainty for investment in infrastructure (chicken and egg situation).
